 - Due Date: October 31
- Syllabi for all classes!
 - Includes those taught by adjuncts
 - Must include student learning outcomes, which should be in alignment with program outcomes
 - Also due October 31 (kept by department assistant at this time)
- CVs for all Faculty!

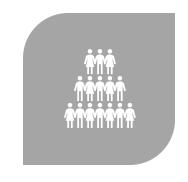

Conservative approach to estimated revenues

Budget is balanced as required by Montana Code

Board of Regents approves final budget at September meeting



State Funding

\$835K in additional state general funding

\$250K in additional performance-based funding



Tuition

\$400K in additional tuition revenue

4% increase for resident students

6% increase for non-resident students



Expenditures

Flat for operating expenses

Increased personnel costs for pay plan implementation
