We are an extension of the DOB's Professional Landman Certificate (PLC) program. Our primary purposes are to spread the word about the existence of the PLC program, establish a network with industry professionals, and ultimately help members attain employment.

In our first year, we organized a speaking event for Trent Sizemore, the owner of Lone Wolf Energy, one of the largest landman companies in Montana. We also held some fundraising events, including an axthrowing competition at the SPE 2019 Winter Bazaar, and we counted 7 members.

As we enter our second year, we have even more ambitious plans. In addition to expanding our membership, we have established contact with over a half-dozen landmen interested in meeting students and speaking about their experiences, and we plan to expand this to industries beyond petroleum.

John Garic Selected to Give Tech's Constitution Day Lecture


Our own John Garic has been selected to give this year's Constitution Day Lecture. The event is scheduled for Thursday, September 17^{th} . The location and time are TBA. The event is free and open to the public.

The title of John's presentation is *The 1787 Constitutional 'Approval' of Slavery and Its Ongoing Legacy in Today's 'Black Lives Matter' Era.* His talk will review slavery during the adoption of our Constitution, during the Civil War Era, the Civil Rights Era and the Black Lives Matter Era.

"I am honored to give this presentation," said John. "This year has been tumultuous and filled with uncertainty and we are going into presidential election season. Yet, our Constitution continues to serve us – one of the most successful democracies in history."

John teaches Oil & Gas Law, Ethics, Business Law and Intro to Business. He is an attorney and former judge from his home state of Louisiana.

STUDENTS RESEARCH IMPACT OF COVID ON SMALL BUSINESSES



Ethan Cooney, a senior in the Information Management option, and Dalton Caron, a Computer Science student, participated in the 2020 Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) Program at Tech.

The title of their research was: Financial Aid Programs Utilized by Small Businesses during the COVID-19 Pandemic.



The basic conclusion of their research was that businesses in certain industries received a higher percentage of financial relief – based on the number of applicants.

Future research will include: how financial aid helped businesses mitigate challenges during the pandemic, examining why a high percentage of businesses in some industries were approved for financial aid while others had a much lower rate, and exploring how businesses plan to cope with a prolonged pandemic.
